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Course Description

Studies the artistic, technical, management, and performance elements of a live theatre production. As a part of the planning, rehearsal, and performance, students assume positions of responsibility and demonstrate basic knowledge and skills in acting, directing, artistic criticism, script analysis, staging, character creation, vocal techniques, and physical movement. Students recognize the responsibilities of the producer, director, actors, designers, technicians, and managers through collaboration in the creation of a theatre performance. Advanced Drama II- Enhances Level-one skills, focusing on student direction and design.

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Course Learning Outcomes/ Goals:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Students will be able to engage in and apply meaningful cultural, literary, and historical research to create acting choices or directorial concepts.
- Students will be able to recognize and interpret artistic choices in many different roles in production during a performance.
- Students will be able to conduct rehearsals and present monologues and scenes for industry-standard auditions.
- Students will be able to identify the impact of theatre on the quality of life in various societies
- Students will be able to demonstrate proper vocal and physical warm-ups before a performance.

Daily Work/Homework

Students will be required to complete weekly homework assignments. Every Monday in Theatre Arts is "Spill the Tea Mondays." Every Monday, for the first 15 minutes of class, we will discuss what has happened in the Entertainment World over the past week. After the discussion, you will be time to write a 2-paragraph journal entry. The two paragraphs are to be completed, edited, and uploaded by Wednesday of every week.

Major Assignments: Descriptions

Every month is a different Heritage Celebration. At the end of every month, a video presentation is due. Record



yourself presenting a presentation of an entertainment Theatre Arts professional of the same heritage as the current month. Students can create a presentation using Google Slides, PowerPoint, Canva, etc. Please save the file as an Mp4 and upload it to Google Classroom for your Quiz grade.

Each presentation should have the following pages:

- 1) Title Page- Person's name and student
- 2) Early Beginnings- Selected Person's DOB, Hometown, Education
- 3) First Breakout Role- What is (was) this person's first big job?
- 4) Major Contribution (s)- What has this person contributed to the industry or humanity?
- 5) Awards- If any
- 6) Currently doing- or DOD
- 7) Why did you select this person?
- 8) List of sources you researched for this information in MLA format
- 9) Video recording or audio recording of you giving the presentation.

For Extra credit, you can do two more additional presentations for the month of June and July.

1. ATTENDANCE POLICY

Attendance will be taken during a 1st period homeroom every day. Students should be in class when the tardy bell rings or risk being marked tardy to class.

Students who have more than five (5) days of unexcused absences during the school year will be considered truant. The legal penalties for truancy include referral of students to Juvenile Court and referral of parents to State Court. Any Georgia resident who has control or charge of a child who is convicted of violating mandatory school attendance requirements will be subject to a fine of not less than \$25.00 and not more than \$100.00, imprisonment not to exceed 30 days, community service, or any combination of such penalties per absence.

2. PENALTIES FOR LATE WORK & POLICIES ON MISSED EXAMS, MAKE-UP EXAMS OR QUIZZES

It is the student's and parent's responsibility, not the teachers', to arrange for make-up work. Students should ask their teacher for any missed assignments on the first day they return to school. The number of days allowed to complete make-up work will be determined by the principal or his/her designee. The days allowed to make up work will not exceed the number of days absent except under extenuating circumstances approved by the principal or his/her designee. Students assigned Out-of-School Suspension (OSS) will be allowed to make up work upon return to school. The number of days to



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complete make-up work is commensurate to the number of days of OSS (i.e.., 3 days of Out-of-School Suspension = 3 days to make up work missed)

<u>Regrading</u> is <u>NOT</u> available in any of the Theatre Arts classes. Once work is submitted, the work given will be graded.
