The Amira Reading Mastery (ARM) score is a composite score that shows the estimated grade level of a student's reading ability.



The Words Correct per Minute (WCPM) score is used to measure ORF. it counts how many words a child reads correctly in a minute during oral reading.

Tips For Helping Lily Right Now

- Help your child describe setting. Ask them to think of a place, real or imaginary. Then ask them to tell you details
  about this place for at least 3-5 minutes so you can clearly see the setting.
- Practice reading common high frequency words your child is likely seeing in books. Examples: is, in, see, out, give, says, said, have, with, end.
- Practice reading common high frequency words by making a list to keep on your fridge. Examples: see, say, said, my, me, your, you, them, us, do, go, doing, going.
