Course Name and Title: Photography

## Materials Needed:

- **Digital Single Reflexive Lens Camera (DSLR)**
- Digital storage that matches your camera (DS card, memory stick, compact flash, etc.)
- Access to a computer/internet to store, manipulate, and send pictures.
- Access to print photos (there will not be very many required but there will be some)

## Course Description:

This course will help the students become well rounded in the fundamentals of digital photography. Four areas of instruction will be emphasized: How cameras work, how composition works, how lighting works, how to use photo editing software. Students will, generally, receive basic instruction, demonstration, and see samples of the desired outcomes, at the beginning of each period. They will be allowed to go outside and shoot assignments, based on what they are learning. Perhaps the most useful part of classroom instruction will be daily reviews of photos students have shot the previous day(s). They will see what makes a successful photo and what does not

## Course Outline and Content:

All students will maintain a digital “sketchbook” of assigned practice work.

The course may include but will not be limited to the following topics:

- Various Camera Modes and their uses
- Flash Modes
- ISO settings
- White Balance
- Lens Focal Length
- Exposure Compensation
- Focusing Options
- Depth of Field (Depth of Focus)
- Macro Photography
- Portraiture
- Landscape
- Action Photography
- Still Life
- Candid Photography
- Indoor Photography
- Fine Art Photography
- Black and White (Monochrome)
- Basic Techniques of Lighting (Including: Front, Side, Back, Defused, etc.)
- Basic Photo Composition (Including: Rule of 3rds, Leading Lines, Framing Subjects, etc.)
- Knowledge of Pixels, Mega Pixels, DPI, PPI

## Special Assignments and Projects:

Students must maintain a digital portfolio of completed work that will be submitted to the teacher at the end of the course to receive maximum credit for this course. There will be several opportunities for students to enter shows and competitions at the school, county, state, and possibly national level. Each student will also be expected to submit several printed photos and at least one printed photo for the Woodland High School Fine Arts Tapestry (Festival) in April.
